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# May the peace of Christ be with you!

As we celebrate the day to thank the Lord for His infinite goodness, I also want to express my gratitude to you. Your friendship and support have helped me and our sisters do the work our Lord wants us to do for His people.

I am amazed and grateful to God for the gift of my religious vocation and even more for allowing me to celebrate the best Fifty Years of my life with Him. I can hardly believe that so many years have gone by. I am still in shock, wondering where the time goes. But what I am sure of is that this Jubilee is the celebration of His love, His fidelity, and His mercy.

"I have come to set the world on fire."

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Going back to my early years, when thinking about what I would do with my life, I now believe that perhaps God saw me as one who needed a bit more help and that the best place for me was to be closer to Him in a convent. God initiated my life into a beautiful Christian-loving family that taught me values and ethics and helped me know God's love through their love and example. My parents, with sacrifice but much hope for our future, sent all my four siblings and me to Catholic school to receive the best education possible. Little by little, in so many ways, God built upon the foundation he had begun until the day I arrived at my final decision.

Without more thought, the next day after my graduation as a Bilingual Executive Secretary and Accountant on June 30, 1972, following His call, I entered the convent in Mexico City with the same sisters I went to school with, the Mercedarian Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament. And how on earth did I get to be a sister, a nun? Why would I make such a choice when I don't even like to pray or go to Mass? All I remember is one of my professors saving, "the world lost a beautiful wife, a lovely mother, and a businesswoman!" Nonetheless. I sensed this was a good choice for me, and I would not lose anything if I tried. Nothing could compare to God. Vows? Hum, it sounds like old-fashioned words. Yet chastity is committed, and faithful love; poverty is more freedom in attitude to material things; obedience, like Mother Mary had, means listening for God's guidance; and overall community is about supporting each other.

It was a leap of faith; not easy to leave family and the comfort of life, friends, and everything else behind, but His call is driven by the fire of His love that is stronger and more powerful than one can imagine. Hard to say in a few words, but I thank God for all the good He has allowed me to accomplish and serve others through the Congregation that lovingly welcomed me. I have served in education as a teacher. principal. administrator. local superior, regional councilor, and regional superior throughout my ministry life. He has allowed me to serve Him and be his hands, voice, feet, eyes, and ears throughout four dioceses.

Now, fifty years later, full of gratitude, I celebrate the gift of my religious life. The day arrived just as the Lord said, "you will not know the day or the time," suddenly, I was at Our Lady of Mount Carmel parish in Cleveland, celebrating а stunning Mass OH of Thanksgiving with my religious family and close friends. Fr. Joseph Eddie, O. de M., was the celebrant. In his homily, he stated how our Lord is maneuvering the ship where I navigate the sea of life with my sisters. What I know is that when high waves, storms, or tsunamis threaten our life, Papa is with us, watching over us as He promised, "Do not be afraid...I will be with you until the end of times" (Math 28:20), and He has been. After communion, I held a lighted candle in my hand and renewed my vows to God. With this symbolism, I declare endless love and fidelity until I meet Him face to face. Perhaps, my only regret is not having loved Him with all my heart and soul all my life. I now sincerely desire not to offend Him and to leave my will in the tabernacle, where He is always waiting for me.

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After fifty years, I can appreciate more the love Papa has for me, my family, and my Congregation. In the last ten years, I have seen the growth of vocations to our religious life here in the USA, and it is clearly a message that Mama Mary wants us to spread the love of her Son Jesus, especially in the Blessed Sacrament. Let others know about His love, wonders, and miracles, which He promised many years ago is still in effect today. And because the pillars of our spirituality are the Blessed Sacrament and Our Lady of Mercy, we are confident, with God's grace, that we, Mercedarian Sisters of the Blessed Sacrament, will continue redeeming captives and forming disciples to follow Him.

We thank God for the young ladies who knock at our convent's door with the sincere desire to love and follow Christ in the charism inspired by the Holy Spirit to our Mother Foundress Maria del Refugio. They seek to spread the love of the Blessed Sacrament, form disciples and redeem prisoners of all modern-day captivities through education and evangelization. With the help of God, we will help them to do so.

In 2025 we will celebrate 100 years of aggregation to the Order of Mercy through which we benefit from the spiritual gifts and graces allotted to the Mercedarian Friars, while still maintaining our autonomy. Finally, in 2026 we will celebrate 100 years in the United States!

With all this in mind, our Institute takes this time to enrich us, the newer generation, with updated studies on the life of our Mother Foundress, Venerable Maria del Refugio Aguilar, and the influence of the Mercedarian Friar, Fr. Alfredo Scotti, O. de M. who assisted and supported us throughout our foundations. By growing in appreciation of all that our sisters before us endured and the wisdom handed on to them, we can become more steeped in our charism and prepared for the challenges of the future. It is for the glory of God, the salvation of souls, and the expansion of the Eucharistic Kingdom that we are here. No vocation is singularly for itself. 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# **The Vow of Chastity in light of Perpetual Profession** by Sr. Katherine Marie Chiara McCloskey, HMSS

On Apr 22, 2022, Sr. Trinity and I professed perpetual vows of poverty, chastity, and obedience, in my hometown of Gainesville, FL. It was such a gift to be espoused to Jesus at St. Augustine's, the parish where I began to form an authentic friendship with Jesus. When I was asked to write a reflection on the vow of chastity, in light of my perpetual profession, my immediate thought was, "How can I possibly write about something where there are no words to accurately express some of the deepest stirrings of my heart?!" So, dear reader, here is a feeble attempt to share my heart with you: A lot of people see the evangelical counsels (poverty, chastity, and obedience) as a hard, oppressive "no" to normal pleasures of the world, but I think these people miss the immense gift that is being received. Simply put, the vow of chastity is reflected in an undivided heart, completely given to God. It is a radical response to the complete gift of self that God offers to each one of us. It is much more than not having sexual relations. It means that no one should get in the way of our first Love (see Revelation 2:4). I have come to learn that Jesus is very protective of this first place in our hearts.

Before big, life-altering events, such as a perpetual profession, it is not uncommon for that person to experience trials. I found myself in some painful, confusing ones before the profession. Thankfully, I had the support of my Sisters and confessor to help me navigate these moments. A few days before the profession, Sr. Trinity and I had a few days of retreat on the shrine grounds of Our Lady of La Leche in St. Augustine, FL. As I sat by the base of the ginormous cross, looking out over the water and thinking about these hard things, I perceived a very clear voice within me say, "Look at Me." Immediately, I knew it was Jesus. As I have come to know who He really is and His Heart for me, I am happy to share that it wasn't hard for me to return His gaze.



I was struck by Jesus saying, "Look at Me," and the ease on my part in responding (this wasn't always the case). I reflected on my journey and it hit me: back in 2012, I heard another clear voice within me, but this one was distinctly female. She said, "Look at Him." Right after hearing Mary's voice, I looked up from the ground at Jesus in the Eucharist and He essentially proposed to me. Now, here I was, on Mary's grounds, hearing her Son speak directly to me. It was a moment of everything coming full circle. From that point forward, "Look at Me " continued to echo in my heart, especially during trying moments leading up to the profession Mass.

I am not a detail oriented person, and there are many details in a perpetual profession Mass. When I was beginning to get nervous about forgetting something, once again I heard, "Look at Me," and all the "ew" feelings began to dissipate as I refocused my attention on the whole point of this vocation. I was experiencing, in a very tangible way, the vow of chastity lived out.

During the profession Mass itself, there were three moments in particular that come to my mind and heart as I wrap up this reflection on the vow of chastity. As I lay prostrate on the church floor during the litany of saints, I remember being fully aware of what was happening. With all of me, I told Jesus that I am His. Then something strange happened: I feel asleep (though I was still aware of my surroundings)! All of the "ew" of the past days, weeks, and months just melted into the floor. When I got up from the ground, I felt different.

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The prayer of consecration and the reception of the ring is the second moment that stands out to me in light of the vow of chastity. The consecration prayer that Sr. Trinity and I chose was close to 3 pages long! (#intense) but such a beautiful realization of what was happening. I remember being filled with joy at this moment. When it was my turn to receive the ring, I shot my hand out so fast! Bishop Eztevez smiled, which I mirrored. I was grateful that Bishop Estevez was the main celebrant, as he journeyed with Sr. Trinity and me since our college days at the University of Florida. The ring he put on my finger is a constant reminder of Jesus' promises to me. He is faithful to His promises.

The third, and most important, moment for me was receiving the Eucharist. After laying down my life, publicly professing the vows perpetually, getting wrecked by the epic consecration prayer, and receiving the ring and a majestic crown of roses, the time came to receive Jesus Himself. I truly have no words for this moment other than I know I married my best friend.





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# Graces of Perpetual Profession Unfold

These words from our Constitutions continue to be impressed upon my heart today. As I was delving deeper into our Constitutions for my preparation to profess perpetual vows, I realized the goal of my life in this Institute is to identify with Christ the Redeemer in his Eucharistic Mystery. I am to become Eucharist with Mary, our Mother of Mercy, as my model. This affects every facet and dimension of my life. I would like to reflect on one aspect of this reality: sense of belonging.

A grace from the profession of perpetual vows that I have received is a deepened sense of belonging to God, to the Church, to my community, and to others. I experience this grace most profoundly through the celebration of the Eucharist when the Mystical Body of Christ gathers and prays as one with Christ as our Head. By the consecration of my life to God in fraternal communion, my life is no longer mine. My life is for the other. "My life is for your freedom in Christ." The more I recognize that my life is not my own, the more I have a sense of belonging. This is the paradox. I could not have imagined that one day I would prostrate on the floor of the church that represents the community through which I came to believe in the Real Presence of Jesus in the Eucharist and decided to follow Jesus Christ as His disciple. Only God, the Most Holy Trinity who infinitely loves, could have orchestrated this moment, and I am grateful to God for calling me to a life so undeserved. I ask for your prayers for the grace of joyful perseverance to the end. All glory to you, Lord God!

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

Lamp ever-burning, reminding: the light of the world is present here! Dwell no longer in darkness. Lord, make of me


